EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Overview

This report examines the opportunities for funding from governmental, nonprofit, and corporate grant programs for the Literacy Council and its partners. Funding opportunities are described and the sources of major grants are identified. Comparisons with other locations of similar size reveal disparities in grant amounts and declining state shares of federal formula grants.

Basic Findings:

- State plans are central to the development and expansion of eligible literacy services. Literacy activities can be integrated into activities funded by Title I, TANF, SSBG, WIA, and other funding streams, if included in those plans and subsequent funding.
- Large government and private grants are frequently available; however, the overwhelming majority of foundation grants are in the \$10,000 to \$40,000 range, while most governmental grants are made to states, ranging in millions of dollars per grant.
- Federal grant announcements provide a very short period to respond. As a result, agility appears to be essential in vying for federal or private grant funding. Vigilance and persistence will be required to compete for opportunities as they arise.
- Statewide, Alabama is not as competitive as other locations in obtaining private grants for literacy. Broader efforts will be required to reach beyond the current levels of funding.

Recommendations:

- The Literacy Council should develop an integrated plan for using Title I, TANF, SSBG, and WIA Title II funding for literacy activities to propose to each of the cognizant state agencies in amending, if needed, the state plan in their respective areas.
- The Literacy Council should establish a mechanism for the timely identification and transmission of federal and state grant announcements to potential recipients in the literacy community.
- The Literacy Council should target larger grants, especially those in the upper ranges to align to the goals of the new regional literacy plan.

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INTRODUCTION

Nonprofit organizations working in the area of literacy education have a wide spectrum of funding opportunities from government and philanthropic foundations and corporations. Funding for literacy activities is generally divided between funding for other services, which incidentally include literacy, such as healthcare and poverty programs, and that which is specifically devoted to literacy, such as literacy for prisoners. Funding is either directly awarded through competitive application processes or channeled through state agencies, schools or colleges through contracts and competitive and formula-driven grants.

In general, government funding for literacy-related activities is extremely fragmented and generally driven by formulas. For the most part, federal grant programs operate through state agencies, with a federally approved plan detailing the program's activities in that state. States differ in their plans and many involve extensive negotiations between state and federal agencies. Some states operate under plans that contain waivers from the general program provisions regarding activities, costs, and performance standards. A myriad of regulations accompany that federal funding, which is almost always provided on a cost reimbursement basis, requiring that any funds drawn are expended within three days. Some grants are awarded competitively, but frequently, the largest federal grants are allocated by formula to recipient agencies, both state and local. Sometimes these grants flow through a tiered system that involves a recipient, such as a state agency, and sub-recipient, such as a local school, nonprofit, or local government agency. In many cases the award is made through a contract between the recipient and sub-recipient, which itself may be allocated through a formula or bid competitively. Most federal grant programs also require that recipients, or sub-recipients, provide a match of some sort. Details vary from program to program and may involve in-kind, non-cash matches.

Private foundations generally offer much more flexibility, sometimes providing unrestricted funding, which can be spent at the discretion of the recipient. Most grant funds typically come from private grants or donations from individuals. Larger foundation grants have become more restrictive over time, sharing many of the same kinds of restrictions and limitations as federal grants including caps on administrative costs and various reporting requirements. Many private foundations also require that recipients provide matching funds or show that they have additional support aside from the grant provided by the grantor. Unrestricted grants are extremely rare.

This report outlines literacy-related opportunities from government funding sources as well as those from philanthropic foundations and corporate giving. The first part deals with government funding, outlining the major funding sources, with more detailed data in Appendices I and II. The second part summarizes private grant funding, with more detailed data in Appendix III. Additional data is contained on the enclosed CD found in the pocket of the back cover.

GOVERNMENT FUNDING

By far, the deepest pockets for funding literacy are federal programs related to public and higher education; however, very little of this funding is specifically directed to the issue of literacy outside traditional classrooms, for stand-alone literacy programs or projects. Several major federal programs include literacy in their entry in the Catalogue of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA). These programs include federal pass-through funds to local schools through the Alabama Department of Education, which provides grants, ostensibly for literacy purposes, to local school systems, not individuals or community groups. In general, providers of supplementary education services are eligible grantees or may participate in funding as sub-recipients or contractors to local schools or other public or nonprofit grantees. Appendix I provides a list of federal programs containing “literacy” in the CFDA entry as well as items located through the Alabama Department of Education, programs related to poverty, and workforce development.

Outlined below are the federally funded programs where stand-alone literacy services might be funded, though in coordination with other services:

U.S. Department of Education, Title I (CFDA Number: 84.010) Also known as Education for the Disadvantaged—Grants to Local Education Agencies, Improving the Academic Achievement of the Disadvantaged, Title I ESEA, Title I LEA Grants, established by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, Title I, Part A, 20 U.S.C. 6301 et seq.

This grant program provides financial support through State and local education agencies (SEAs and LEAs) to schools with the highest percentage of low-income children, targeting those who are at risk of failing in school. Schools with more than 40 percent of students who come from low income families may choose to operate a school wide program, in consultation with parents, staff, and district staff. Any school-wide or targeted assistance programs must be based on effective means of improving student achievement and include strategies to support parental involvement. Obviously, programs that provide literacy services to parents can be funded with Title I funds. It is important to remember that literacy providers may contract with school systems to provide literacy services to parents.

As with most federally funded programs that provide pass-through funding to local entities, the cognizant agency, which in this case is the Alabama Department of Education, must submit a state plan that includes provisions for expending funds on particular activities.

“SEAs apply for funds as part of Title I, Part A, State plans submitted to the Department of Education in accordance with Section 1111 of ESEA or as part of a consolidated State plan submitted under Section 9302 of ESEA. The plan remains in effect for the duration of the State's participation in Title I, Part A, but must be updated to reflect substantive changes. Participating LEA's must file an approved plan with their SEAs.”

Twenty-First Century Community Learning Centers (CFDA 84.287) Authorized by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended, Title IV, Part B.

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers are intended to create academic enrichment opportunities for children, particularly students who attend high-poverty and low-performing schools. The program helps students meet state and local student standards in core academic subjects, such as reading and math; offers students a broad array of enrichment activities that can complement their regular academic programs; and offers literacy and other educational services to the families of participating children. Projects funded under this program must be for the purpose of meeting the needs of the residents of rural and inner city communities, through the creation or expansion of community learning centers. These are formula grants to the states. In Alabama, these grants are administered by the Alabama Department of Education.

Eligible entities that receive awards **from the state** may use the funds to carry out a broad array of before- and after-school activities to advance student achievement year-round.

According to the U.S. Department of Education website, the eligible activities for 21st Century funding include (See <http://www.ed.gov/programs/21stcccl/index.html>):

- Remedial education activities and academic enrichment learning programs, including those which provide additional assistance to students to allow the students to improve their academic achievement;
- Mathematics and science education activities;
- Arts and music education activities;
- Entrepreneurial education programs;
- Tutoring services, including those provided by senior citizen volunteers, and mentoring programs;
- Programs that provide after-school activities for limited English proficient (LEP) students and that emphasize language skills and academic achievement;
- Recreational activities;
- Telecommunications and technology education programs;
- Expanded library service hours;
- Programs that promote parental involvement and family literacy;
- Programs that provide assistance to students who have been truant, suspended, or expelled to allow them to improve their academic achievement;
- Drug and violence prevention programs;
- Counseling programs; and
- Character education programs.

Margaret Doughty reports that in Houston, Texas, these funds have been used to develop parent education projects in the 21st Century Schools (\$300,000).

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (CFDA 93.558) Also known by the acronym, TANF, this program was established by the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 as part of the federal welfare replacing the older Aid to Families with Dependent Children program. In Alabama, the cognizant agency for TANF is the Department of Human Resources.

TANF funds are provided to states in block grants which require a state-funded portion called the Maintenance of Effort (MOE) based on its prior financial commitments to the old AFDC program. Depending on the approved state plan, state funds spent to meet the MOE generally have the same character as TANF funds, which may be used to provide direct benefits or to assist individuals in moving to self-sufficiency. State plans defined the TANF allowable activities for participants to meet work requirements necessary to continue receiving benefits. The amount provided to the state includes direct payments to individuals for support, or what had historically been termed ‘welfare payments.’

In the preceding AFDC program, the JOBS program had been established to help recipients gain employment. TANF includes work requirements, some of which are funded through state-generated funds that are required for the state to qualify for the full federal portion. A plan for both the TANF and MOE portions of the funding is required. In Alabama the work activities include literacy, in both the state-funded MOE portion and the TANF funded portion of the program. As described in the *Annual Report on State TANF and MOE Programs – 2005* for Alabama as “Employability Advancement Activities,” the work activities include “Educational activities, including but not limited to secondary education, GED, literacy training and college” (See <http://www.acf.hhs.gov/programs/ofa/MOE-05/alabama.htm>).

In Cleveland, Ohio, the literacy coalition used these funds, in partnership with Cuyahoga County Department of Health and Human Services, to provide capacity building services for literacy providers to increase services to adults and out-of-school youth with limited skills for pre-employment training and career preparation.

In the MOE-funded portion of the program, literacy is included as an MOE expense described as “Work Related activities/expenses: On-the-Job Training, Job Search, Job Readiness, Preparation for Employment Program (PREP), Community Service Employment Program (CEMP), Vocational Education, Individual Business Entrepreneurial Activities, Educational activities to include but not limited to, secondary education, GED, Literacy training and college.” Funding for this and other related items listed (See Appendix IX: State Plans, for additional details).

In Alabama, TANF funding flows through the Department of Human Resources, which also administers Title XX, Social Services Block Grant funds.

Title XX, Social Services Block Grant (CFDA 93.667) Authorized by the Social Security Act, Title XX, as amended; Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, as amended, Public Law 97-35; Jobs Training Bill, Public Law 98-8; Public Law 98-473; Medicaid and Medicare Patient and Program Act of 1987; Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987, Public Law 100-203; Family Support Act of 1988, Public Law 100- 485; Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993, Public Law 103-66; 42 U.S.C. 1397 et seq. This grant is well-known among state agencies for its relative flexibility.

States may use Title XX, Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) funds to provide services in any of the following five goals: (1) To prevent, reduce, or eliminate dependency; (2) **to achieve or maintain self-sufficiency**; (3) to prevent neglect, abuse, or exploitation of children and adults; (4) to prevent or reduce inappropriate institutional care; and (5) to secure admission or referral

for institutional care when other forms of care are not appropriate. Each State is required to develop and submit an annual pre-expenditure report that describes how it plans to administer SSBG funds for the coming year. As part of that plan, states may opt to transfer funds from TANF into SSBG, thereby obtaining additional flexibility. In Alabama, the Department of Human Resources administers SSBG funding and develops the state plan. According to the Administration for Children and Families, Alabama's FY 2008 allocation of SSBG will be \$18.3 million (see <http://www.acf.hhs.gov/programs/ocs/ssbg/docs/allocs.html>).

In FY 2005, the most recent report available, Alabama transferred \$10.5 million of TANF funds into its \$26.1 million SSBG grant for a total of \$36.6 million of SSBG funding. (See

<http://www.acf.hhs.gov/programs/ocs/ssbg/annrpt/2005/chapter2.html>). The following year, the Department of Human Resources reported a grand total of \$44.5 million in SSBG funding (See <http://www.dhr.state.al.us/page.asp?pageID=625>). There is no cap on the amount of SSBG that might be used for literacy, but only four states used SSBG funding for education and training services. Alabama did not report using any of its SSBG funding for literacy in FY 2005 (see <http://www.acf.hhs.gov/programs/ocs/ssbg/annrpt/2005/states-05/Alabama.html>).

The Workforce Investment Act (WIA) reformed federal employment, adult education, and vocational rehabilitation programs to move toward an integrated, "one-stop" system of workforce investment and education activities for adults and youth. The Adult Education State Grant Program, authorized by the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act and funded through the U.S. Department of Education are mandatory partners in the WIA system.

Within the broader WIA program, there are a number of opportunities for literacy providers to participate in one or more of the WIA activities. Literacy services are included as allowable

"Expenditures for education and training services fluctuated from 2001 to 2005. However, SSBG expenditures more than doubled during the past year, from \$8.4 million in 2004 (17 States) to \$17.5 million in 2005 (16 States).

activities in various parts of the broad span of WIA programs. The U.S. Department of Labor administers the bulk of WIA funding for Adults, Dislocated Workers, WIA Youth Activities (formerly JTPA Summer Youth and JTPA Youth), and through incentive grants (CFDA 17.267). However, the most relevant portion of the program is in WIA Title II (CFDA 84.002), which is

administered by the U.S. Department of Education’s Office of Vocational and Adult Education. (See Adult Education and Family Literacy Act, Chapter 2, Public Law 105-220, and Workforce Investment Act, Section 503. 20 U.S.C. 1201 et seq.).

For the portion of WIA administered by the U.S. Department of Labor, WIA funding is allocated to states and then by state workforce agencies for training services, generally at two-year colleges and technical schools, under the auspices of the local WIA board or its equivalent. In Alabama, three WIA boards have been established.

Most WIA funding flows through contractual or sub-recipient relationships; however, governors may retain up to 15 percent for statewide initiatives. In general, the other 85 percent of WIA funds are subject to allocation decisions by Alabama’s workforce boards, which generally administer the federal grant. Still, Section 191(a) of the Workforce Investment Act states that all WIA funds “shall be subject to appropriation by the state Legislature.” Coordination among boards entities could enhance literacy funding. However, literacy is specifically mentioned only twice in the state plan, exclusively in reference to the definitions of common

performance measures for youth programs (See Appendix IX, *State of Alabama Workforce Development and Wagner Peyser Plan for July 2007 - June 2008*, pp. 80, 87).

Most importantly, the WIA state plan requires that local workforce boards establish eligible training providers lists with whom they contract for services. Local Workforce Investment Boards (LWIBs), in partnership with the State, determine training program eligibility. Some providers are automatically eligible. These include postsecondary institutions that are eligible to receive Federal funds under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, which provide programs leading to an associate degree, baccalaureate degree, or certificate. Also, an entity that provides training programs under the National Apprenticeship Act is automatically eligible. The latter includes universities, colleges, community colleges, some proprietary schools, and apprenticeship programs registered with the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training within the U. S. Department of Labor. Procedures for applying to be an eligible provider, and how to appeal adverse decisions, are also outlined in the state plan.

The widest opening for literacy providers within the WIA system is through the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA), Chapter 2, Public Law 105-220, and Workforce Investment Act, Section 503. 20 U.S.C. 1201 et seq. This program is often referenced as Title II of WIA, or WIA Title II. As usual in federal programs, funding again flows through a state plan. In this case, one submitted by the Alabama Department of Postsecondary Education.

Eligible services provided through WIA Title II include: adult education and literacy services, including workplace literacy services; family literacy services; and English literacy programs. One of the assurances that the U.S. Department of Education requires in state plans is that the eligible agency will award not less than one grant to an eligible provider who offers flexible schedules and necessary support services (such as child care and transportation) to enable individuals, including individuals with disabilities, or individuals with other special needs, to participate in adult education and literacy activities, including coordination with support services that are not provided through WIA Title II funding.

With regard to WIA, TANF, and Title II funding, there is a tendency to confuse federal pass-through funding for state-funded appropriations. In most states, pass-through funds are specifically appropriated while some have blanket riders generally authorizing agencies to spend federal grants. The appropriation serves to authorize expenditures of federal funds by a state entity, but they are still federal funds and subject to the same requirements and limitations attached to any federal funding.

The literacy coalition in Hartford, Connecticut is co-located with the Workforce Investment Board One-Stop so that the literacy services can be infused in all the work of the One-Stops.

Except in certain instances where TANF MOE is used, the State of Alabama does not provide funding specifically for literacy programs from its own resources. Workforce Investment Boards, the Departments of Education and Postsecondary Education, local school systems, and other state agencies and partners are currently in the funding pipeline for most of the larger grant programs. As mentioned, management of most large federal grants involves the Department of Human Resources, Department of Education, the Department of Postsecondary Education, or the

Alabama Department of Economic Development, and Workforce Investment Boards. In most instances, but not always, federal funds are actually appropriated by the state legislatures under the principle that the federal grant is to the state. WIA funds are appropriated. Adult education and literacy programs are funded through federal grants to the states. The amount each state receives is based on a congressional formula. States, in turn, distribute funds to local eligible entities to provide adult education and literacy services. Individuals and local providers cannot receive grant money directly from the Office of Vocational and Adult Education (OVAE) <http://www.ed.gov/about/offices/list/ovae/pi/AdultEd/index.html>

Appendices III-V provide breakdowns of the internal statewide allocations for Alabama across these various federal funding streams (See CD in back envelope). Many of the programs identified in the CFDA contain subcategories of activities. For example, the Office of Adult Education and Literacy provides grants through a program officially designated as Adult Education – Basic Grants to the States (CFDA 84.002) cited above in reference to WIA. English Language (EL) Civics (also known as EL/Civics) is one of the grant programs administered by the U.S. Department of Education. A detailed description of the can be found on its website at: <http://www.ed.gov/about/offices/list/ovae/pi/AdultEd/elctopic.html>.

According to the website, “The English Literacy and Civics Education Program is an integrated program of educational services to immigrants and other limited English proficient populations to acquire the basic skills they need to function effectively as parents, workers, and citizens. Local providers implementing EL/Civics programs are charged with incorporating instruction on the rights and responsibilities of citizenship and civic participation.”

Congress directed the Office of Vocational and Adult Education to provide EL/Civics grants solely to states. EL/Civics state funds are awarded in a formula where 65 percent is allocated based on a state's absolute need as determined by calculating each state's share of a 10-year average data for immigrants admitted for legal permanent residence for the 10 most recent years as reported by the INS (now USCIS), and 35 percent allocated to growing states as indicated by the average of the last three years. Additionally, no state is allocated less than \$60,000, regardless of the calculations above. Table 2, on the following page, show the allocation to Alabama for both the adult education and EL/Civics funding.

Although sometimes designated by some entities with a special CFDA number, 84.002A, no such number exists in the CFDA. Local entities that receive funding for EL/Civics do so through their state agencies. In the Alabama budget, EL/Civics is not uniquely identifiable as a funding source, though it is certainly part of the items recognized as “Federal Adult Education” in the budget of the Department of Postsecondary Education.

Adult Education and Family Literacy Act funds are distributed by formula to states using Census data on the number of adults (for people aged 16 and older) in each state who lack a high school diploma and who are not enrolled in school. States must match 25 percent of the federal contribution with state or local funds.

Although the overall amount has almost doubled since 1996, Alabama’s share of the allocation for EL/Civics has declined from a high of 2.6 percent of the national total to about 1.7 percent in recent years as the population has not kept pace with the rest of the country.

According to the U.S. Department of Education, states competitively award 82.5 percent of their federal grants to local school districts, community colleges, community- and faith-based organizations, and other providers to support adult education programs. States retain 17.5 percent of the federal allocation, of which 12.5 percent is allocated for program improvement activities, such as professional development for instructors, and five percent for administrative expenses (See <http://www.ed.gov/about/offices/list/ovae/pi/AdultEd/ae flapro facts.doc>)

Recommendation: The Literacy Council should develop an integrated plan for using Title I, TANF/, SSBG, and WIA Title II funding for literacy activities to propose to each of the cognizant state agencies in amending, if needed, the state plan in their respective areas.

Other Federal Programs

In general, the best venue for monitoring the availability of federal funding is the consolidated federal grants website at www.grants.gov. New grants are posted daily and often require a response within two weeks to one month.

Compassion Capital Fund

One of the most promising opportunities for nonprofit literacy providers is the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Administration for Children & Families' Compassion Capital Fund, which offers one-time capacity development mini-grants of \$50,000 for each recipient organization (http://www.acf.hhs.gov/programs/ccf/about_ccf/prgm_target_cap.html). As of the end of 2006, there had been approximately 574 community and faith-based organizations that received one-time mini-grants, and approximately, 65 intermediary organizations, and 100 entities affiliated with Communities Empowering Youth program aimed at reducing gang involvement and youth violence and fostering positive youth development.

The Compassion Capital Fund focuses on the development of grass-roots organizations and requires a 20 percent match. However, intermediaries may not require match from sub-recipients even if the applicants offer matching funds in their applications.

Of all federal programs, the Compassion Capital Fund appears to provide the best opportunity for entities in the Literacy Council's service area. In theory, an organization from each of the counties could apply, which would increase the total capacity building funding for the area to \$250,000. Coordination among partners in the two most rural counties might be strengthened if these resources were available.

The Compassion Capital Fund offers a great opportunity for Literacy Council partners to develop the capacity to manage additional grant funding effectively. According to the program description at the Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children & Families, the capacity development mini-grants of \$50,000 can provide training in the following critical areas: (1) leadership development, which includes board composition and function, professional development, volunteer training and succession planning; (2) organizational development, which includes planning, board governance, systems management, human resource, finance and information technology, policies and procedures, fiscal controls, communications strategies, and nonprofit incorporation; (3) program development, which includes curriculum development, program monitoring, and evaluating outcomes; (4) revenue development, which includes designing donor development strategies, grant writing training, donor development training, and donor tracking software; and (5) community engagement, which includes asset mapping, needs assessment, and establishing collaborative relationships.

State and Local Funding

As previously mentioned, the State of Alabama does not provide funding specifically for literacy programs from its own revenues, except in certain instances where TANF MOE is used to

provide services that might be literacy related. The state does provide funding for K-12 education through the Education Trust Fund and appropriations to postsecondary education.

Local governments may appropriate funds for schools, nonprofits, charities, and assorted memberships and partnerships. In Birmingham appropriations to nongovernmental local organizations amounted to more than \$294 million in FY 2006, but none appeared to be literacy-related. Of course, most local funding for literacy-related activities resides in local school budgets, based on local property and sales tax revenues. Variations among local governments in the rate of taxation are wide and numerous in Alabama's local jurisdictions. Moreover, the tax yield from a particular rate varies greatly as well. As a result, the ability to match funding is uneven as well. Localities capable of raising funds may not be in as much need as those that have great difficulty raising matching funds. (For an extended discussion of Alabama's tax system, see Ira Harvey's *A History of Educational Finance in Alabama, 1819-1986*).

Summary of Government Funding

Most governmental funding for literacy-related activities outside local school systems flows from federal sources. Program funding for most federal programs requires some form of integration with state plans or waivers approved by the corresponding federal agency. Federal funding then flows through state-level agencies or regional boards to local entities through formulas or competitive grant making. A few opportunities exist for obtaining grants directly from the federal government, but announcements are erratic, unpredictable, and have short turn-around times for submission after the initial announcement in the *Federal Register* or at www.grants.gov. Agility, alertness, and persistence will be required to take advantage of these opportunities.

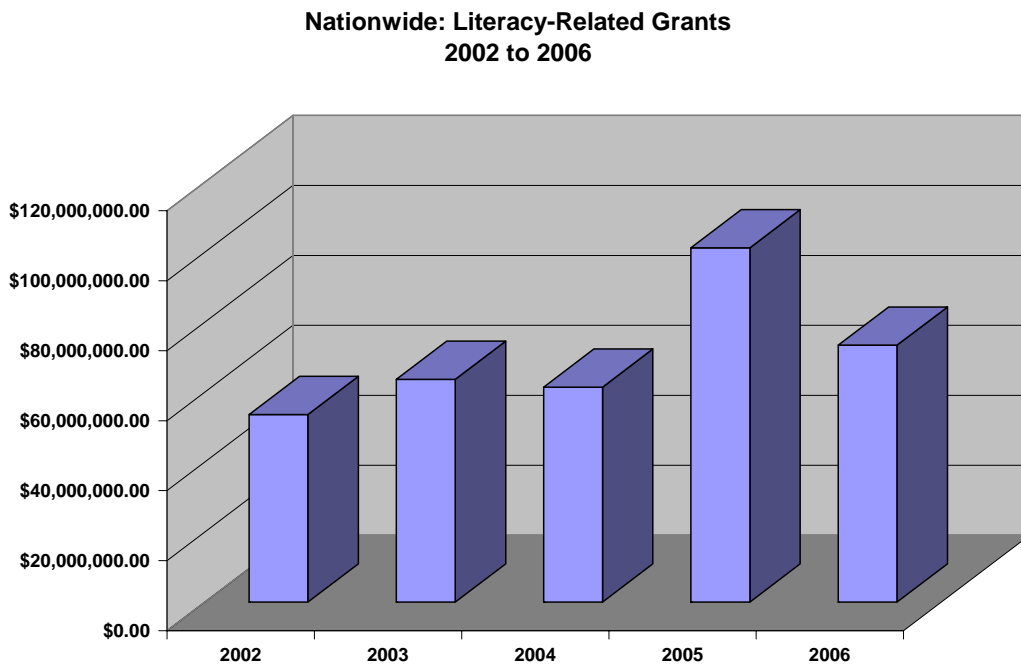
<p>Recommendation: The Literacy Council should establish a mechanism for the timely identification and transmission of federal and state grant announcements to potential recipients in the literacy community.</p>
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PRIVATE GRANT FUNDING

A wide variety of charitable and philanthropic organizations provide grants to literacy-related organizations in the United States. Among these grant makers are some of the largest foundations and business organizations in the world. An examination of their grant-making patterns reveals a number of opportunities for the Literacy Council to pursue.

While data regarding governmental funding at the federal and state levels are fairly stable, the best information from Guidestar and The Foundation Center changes dynamically as new information added. As such, estimates derived from these sources tend to be marginally less precise than for federal or state data. For example, a query of The Foundation Center's on-line system on October 28, 2007, using the keyword "literacy" yielded 6,472 results, and on October 30, 2007 the same query yielded 6,629 results, and 6,664 on November 1, 2007.

The final data set extract from The Foundation Center included 6,625 results. The difference is generally attributable to grants authorized in 2007, which is not yet complete in the on-line database. According to The Foundation Center database, nationwide, foundations and corporations provided approximately \$358.7 million in funding for literacy-related grants between 2002 and 2007.

While 2007 data are incomplete, Figure 1 illustrates that literacy-related funding is subject to wide fluctuations. The fluctuations may not be indicative of actual changes in literacy funding, but in overall expenditures in the grants that contain some literacy-related activities. As with federal programs, many of the grants identified in the database contained an embedded element

of literacy, but might not be considered entirely literacy focused. Table 3 provides a summary of the data gleaned from the Foundation Center database.

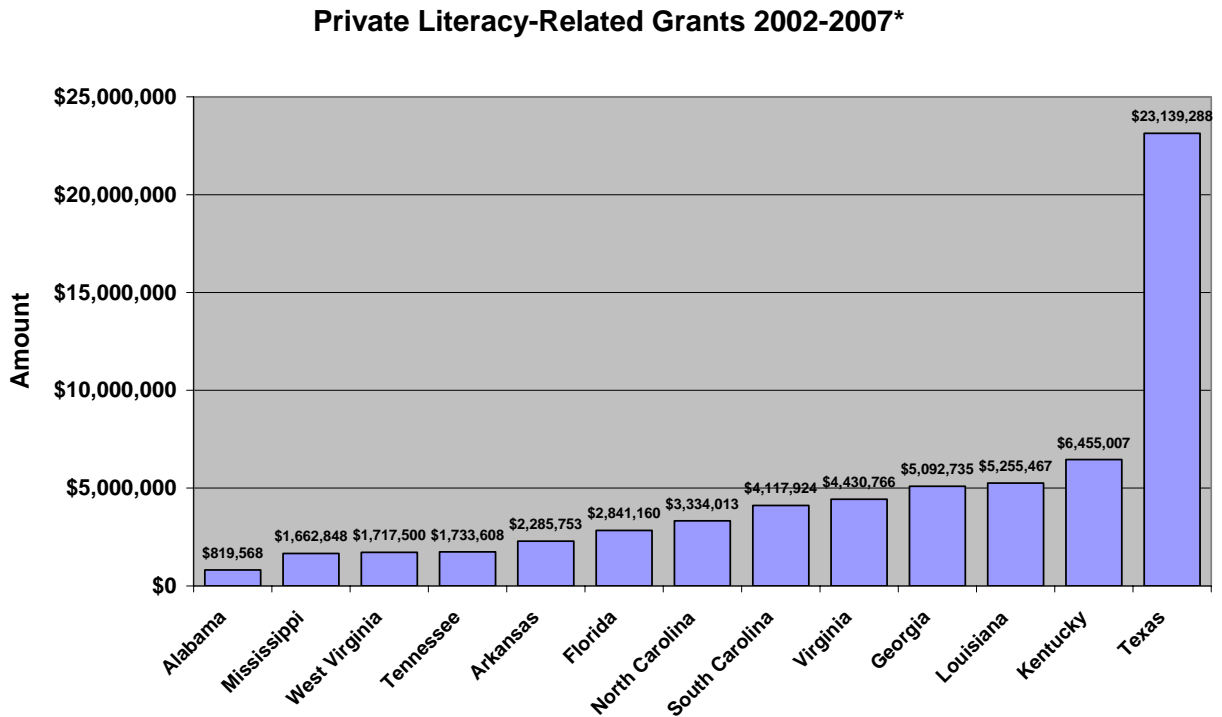
These data are merely snapshots of reports from private foundations. Compared to the aggregate amounts of literacy-related funding from the federal government, the grand total for the five-year span seems miniscule. Nevertheless, there are substantial funding opportunities available in this arena. As one might expect, the amount of grants that literacy-related organizations have from private or nonprofit organizations were much smaller than the amounts allocated to Alabama through major federal programs.

In comparative terms, Alabama does much more poorly in obtaining private funding than it does in federally funded programs, which are driven by need-based formulas, based on population demographics.

To explore the patterns of grant-making in Alabama, a search of The Foundation Center’s grants database using the keyword “literacy” combined with a filter that provided a breakdown of literacy-related funding in each of the Southeastern states.

The total amount while indicating the location of Alabama yielded the amounts displayed in Figure 2.

From 2002 to 2007, literacy-related grants in Texas dwarfed the other states in part because of the presence of the Barbara Bush Texas Fund for Family Literacy, which received large grants and donations from major foundations and corporations. Likewise, Kentucky enjoys the presence of the National Center for Family Literacy. Still, the amount attributable to the Barbara Bush Texas Fund for Family Literacy only partially explains the differences, which amounts to \$6.3 million. Removing that amount still leaves approximately \$17 million in literacy-related grants.

Although the Texas population is about five times that of Alabama, the difference in grants is more than 17 times that of Alabama. Obviously, there is more to this difference than population. In part, the difference might also be attributable to the much larger proportion of the population that is Spanish speaking. It is also true that the Texas Rio Grande Valley is one of the poorest, most impoverished locations in the nation. Sadly, poverty does tend to attract grants from philanthropic organizations. That is also true of Mississippi, which attracted more than twice as much as Alabama in grants during the same period.

Comparing the Literacy Council Area to Peer Areas

It is useful to compare funding and resources between comparable areas. According to the Census' American Factfinder data, the twenty metropolitan statistical areas (MSA) nearest in size to the Birmingham MSA. These MSAs differed in a number of significant ways, geographically, demographically, and economically. Nevertheless, this cohort of locations also includes several locations that might be considered competitors for the Birmingham area in terms of attracting businesses and industries that would look at the overall educational level of the population in making decisions about location.

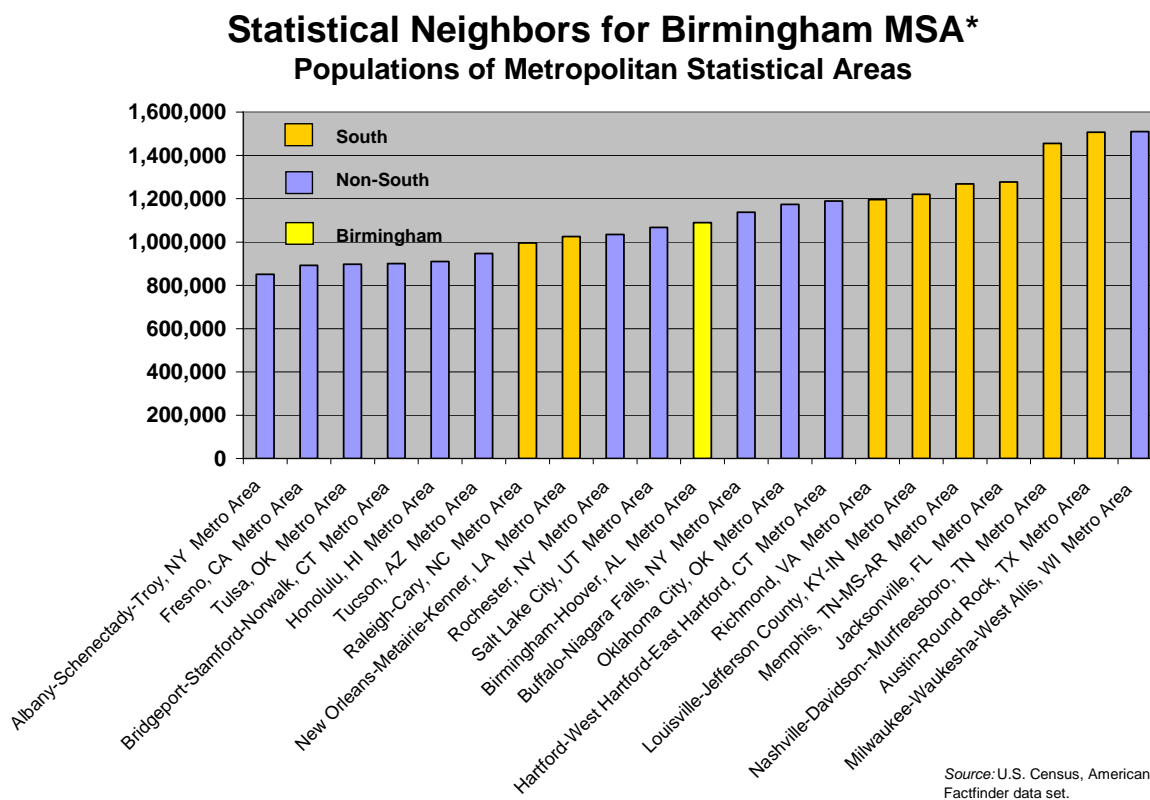
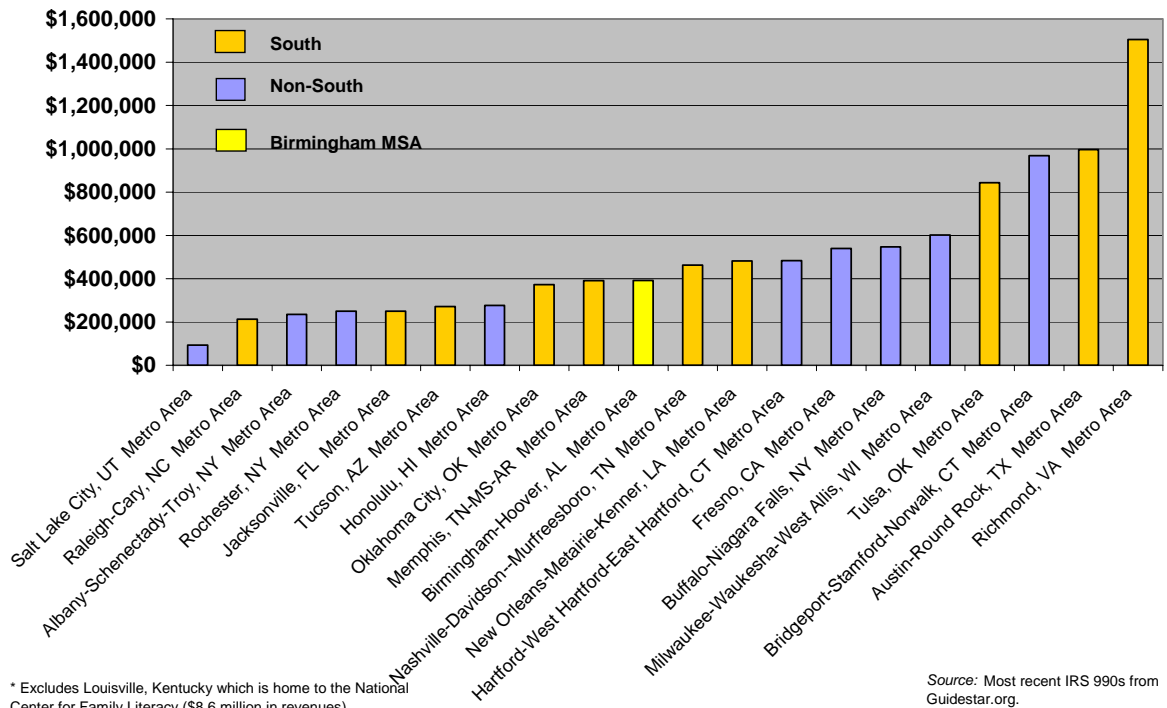


Figure 3 shows the relative differences in size for each of the 20 other MSAs closest to the size of the Literacy Council's area. Ranging between 800,000 and almost 1.6 million, these metropolitan areas also include some of the most dynamic economies in the country, many of which are considered competitors in the national, if not global, economy. Moreover, half of these peers, ten in all, are located in the South and Southeast.

The Guidestar database provided additional information regarding the literacy-related entities located in those areas. An interesting picture of grant funding appeared, as shown in Figure 7 below.

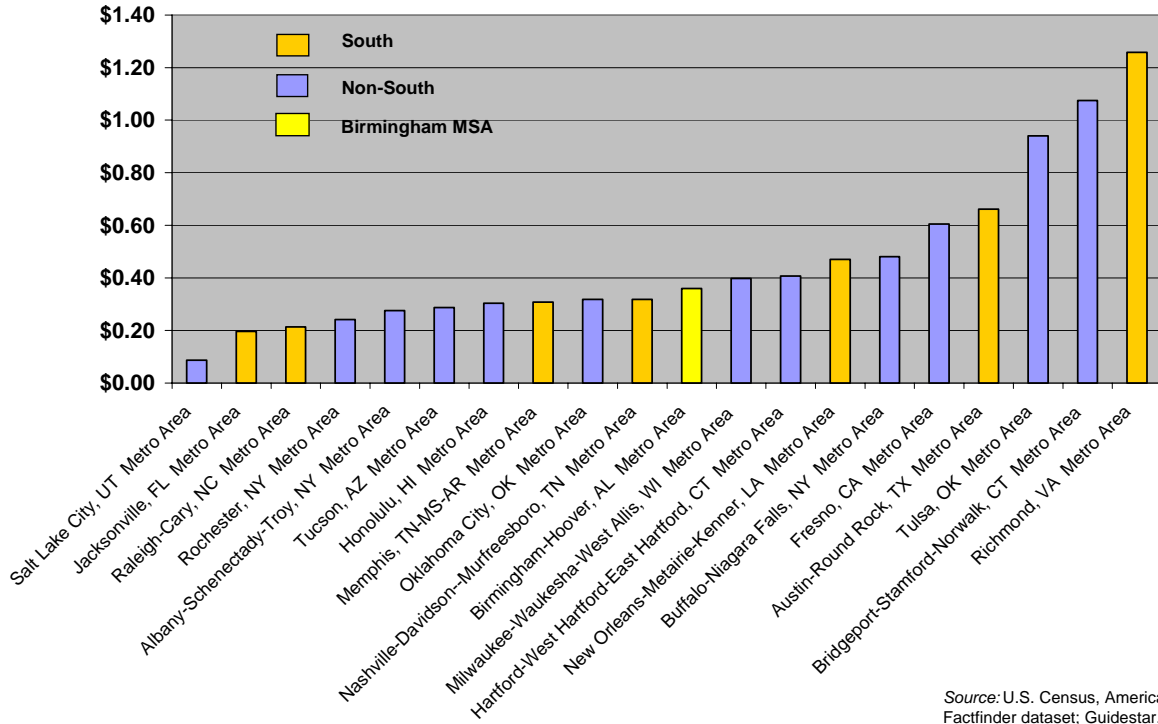
The Louisville-Jefferson County MSA was an extreme outlier with \$8.7 million in literacy funding; however, that amount included the National Center for Family Literacy. It was impossible to disentangle that amount from other local sources, so the Louisville-Jefferson County MSA was dropped from further comparisons. Nevertheless, it is evident that there are significant differences between the upper and lower ranges for this set of MSAs. Birmingham literacy organizations are only \$130,000 above the average of the lower nine, but more than \$350,000 below the upper ten. On a *per capita* basis, the differences are clearer.

Figure 5 shows the *per capita* revenues for literacy-related nonprofits in each of the MSAs, excluding Louisville-Jefferson County. While Birmingham’s relative rank among the MSAs is little changed by the *per capita* comparisons, the absolute differences between the MSAs in literacy-related funding is quite stark.

What is even more interesting, and worth further consideration and research, is the fact that some of the more economically competitive areas provide more per capita funding for literacy organizations than the Literacy Council’s area. Although the impact of literacy funding on the local economies is beyond the scope of this report, it would be worth examining more thoroughly in the future to determine whether there are quantifiable returns on investment for literacy-related funding initiatives. Such an analysis might be used in developing performance indicators for literacy initiatives.

Where Do Private Grants Come From?

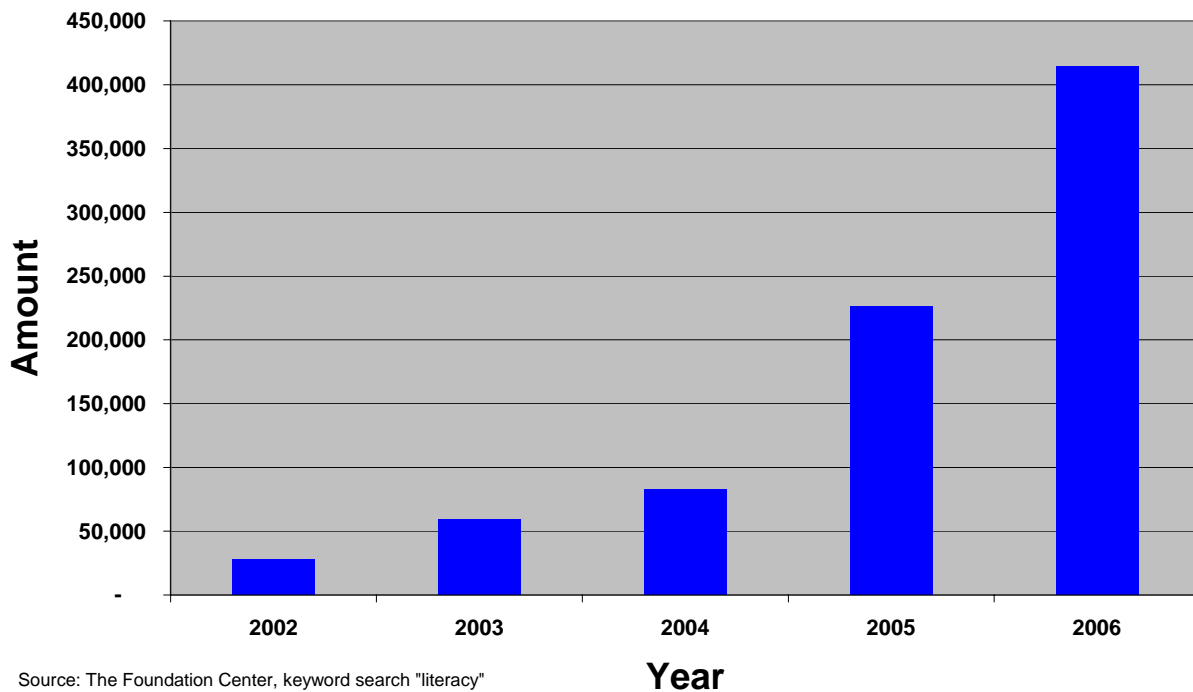
The differences between organizations in *per capita* revenues is quite dramatic, and raises questions about where the funding sources for the organizations. Turning to the source of funding, in particular grants, there is a wealth of information to mine for answers.

There are wide differences among grants and several patterns of grant-making nationwide. What was most interesting was the percentage of grants made by donors who were in-state and out-of-state relative to the recipient. Many of the largest and most generous grant makers offer grants beyond the immediate locale of their home offices. A number of large philanthropic organizations, like the Casey Foundation, Ford Foundation, Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and Kellogg Foundation provide funding for organizations outside the borders of their home states. Venerable names like J.P. Morgan, AT&T, and others also provide numerous grants, although many of the larger foundations are found in more populous states display a pattern of funding in those same states. This tends to be more common among companies than among foundations (Appendices III, X and XI provides a list of the most prolific and most generous grant-makers in the area of literacy-related activities).

Figure 6 illustrates the relative lack of private grant-making in Alabama for literacy-related activities. In fact, grants to literacy-related organizations in Mississippi are more than double the amounts granted in Alabama.

It should be noted that the large increases in funding in 2005 and 2006 resulted from three major donations to two recipients, one from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to Cooper Green Hospital Foundation and two grants from the Casey Foundation to the Fair Housing Agency of Alabama. These grants were not primarily concerned with literacy, but contained some reference to literacy in the database.

Another feature of private literacy-related funding Alabama is that much of it comes from outside Alabama. Almost half, 49.7 percent, of the grant funds located using The Foundation Center database were from organizations domiciled outside Alabama. These include some of the more generous grant makers, both for Alabama and for other areas of the country. Many larger grant makers also provide larger grants, though this is not a uniform observation as some of the largest corporations provide very small grants to a large number of grantees nationwide.

Of course, many of these same organizations also have operations in Alabama as well, as shown in Table 4 below. Many other organizations are potential grantors

Nationally, private grants for literacy activities in the middle range (25 percent from the bottom and 25 percent from the top) range from \$10,000 to \$40,000. In the Literacy Council area, the middle 50 percent ranged from \$5,000 to \$20,000, a range that is exactly half of the national pattern. It is fairly obvious that the lower overall total is indicative of generally lower grant amounts to literacy organizations in Alabama.

Recommendation: The Literacy Council should target larger grants, especially those in the upper quartile in the population of grants (above \$50,000).

Summary of Private Grant Funding

Though much smaller in overall magnitude, the number of opportunities for locating previously untapped funding is much greater than the number of untapped opportunities in government funding. In either case, competition for grants is always tough and crowded by many applicants.

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

FINDINGS

Several conclusions can be drawn from the data collected:

- State plans are central to the development and expansion of eligible literacy services. Literacy activities can be integrated into activities funded by Title I, TANF, SSBG, WIA, and other funding streams, if included in those plans and subsequent funding.
- Large government and private grants are frequently available; however, the overwhelming majority of foundation grants are in the \$10,000 to \$40,000 range, while most governmental grants are made to states, totaling millions of dollars.
- Federal grant announcements provide a very short period to respond. As a result, agility appears to be essential in vying for federal or private grant funding. Vigilance and persistence will be required to compete for opportunities as they arise.
- Statewide, Alabama is not as competitive as other locations in obtaining private grants for literacy. Broader efforts will be required to reach beyond the current levels of funding.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- **The Literacy Council should develop an integrated plan for using Title I, TANF/, SSBG, and WIA Title II funding for literacy activities to propose to each of the cognizant state agencies in amending, if needed, the state plan in their respective areas.**

To find support for literacy activities in government programs will require more than a wait-and-see approach to grant announcements. Most federal programs require states to develop plans, which specify which services will be funded. Participating in the planning process is an essential element in promoting literacy-related activities for federally funded programs. Partnering with state agencies to pursue grants that the state may not be pursuing, locating matching funds, and facilitating the identification of existing matches not yet claimed would enhance the integration of literacy initiatives with existing programs.

- **The Literacy Council should establish a mechanism for the timely identification and transmission of federal and state grant announcements to potential recipients in the literacy community.**

The Council should establish a sentinel system, a sort of full-time lookout for funding opportunities. To ensure that Literacy Council partners do not miss grant opportunities a full-time staff member should monitor *Grants.gov*, *Guidestar.org*, *The Foundation Center*, and other grant lists for grant announcements and continually mine databases to identify new opportunities. Some grant makers have a list of people to whom they email

announcements about grant opportunities. Commonly known as a LISTSERV, these channels of communication are usually free to join by requesting that the owner place one's name on the list. Many of the larger grant-makers have funded programs outside their home states. Untapped, out-of-state grant-makers with a pattern of funding literacy programs make ideal targets for finding new funding. Some of these entities also have operations or connections to Alabama

- **The Literacy Council should target larger grants, especially those in the upper ranges of the population of grants (above \$50,000).**

The Central Alabama region is under-funded relative to other areas of similar size partly as a result of smaller grant amounts being awarded. Increasing the amounts per grant pursued and awarded will be a key factor in bringing more resources to the table. To do this, a number of capacity building activities need to be put in motion including the consolidation of grant-writing efforts for multiple smaller entities to enhance efficiency and to ensure that fiscal accountability systems are in place for potential recipients and sub-recipients. To build this capacity, the Council should coordinate applications for Compassion Capital Fund grants to build the organizational capacity to pursue additional funding.

Larger amounts will need to be well justified and supported with statistics and solid evaluation plans that show how the funds will be used. Performance measures help make the case that the funding has made an impact. Developing results-oriented outcome measures would enhance the Council's grant-seeking efforts and validate the Council's impact in the community.
